Disability Toilet Access Cards

You can get your Card from WAOA.

These cards authorise Members to use Disabled Toilets in public places and must be shown if your use of these toilets is questioned.

Alternatively, you can request order forms be sent and post them back to us. You can also drop them off at HQ or in the mailbox at the door.

If you have to email your order, send to orders@waostomy.org.au

Submit your order 14 days in advance.

Keep Us Up to Date

Please advise us in writing (website, email, post or fax) of any changes to your details:

- Address
- Phone numbers
- Email address
- Medicare number and expiry date
- Concession card number
- If you have a reversal scheduled or you've had a stoma reversal

Temporary Ostomates

Fees must be paid for access to the Stoma Appliance Scheme (SAS).

They should be paid by the second month after surgery.

Products may be held until payment has been received.

If payment presents a difficulty, Members should contact WAOA, as instalment arrangements can be made.

Fees are payable by July 1st each year.

Membership Fee

Membership Fee for 2025/26:

- Full Member: \$100
- Concession Member: \$90

These fees are payable to WAOA before you receive products from the Stoma Appliance Scheme (SAS)

Payment is due before 1 July each year.

Order Additional Stoma Supplies

If you are using more products than usual for some reason, you need to be reviewed by your STN (or GP) to find the cause and ensure the correct products are being used. They will be able to complete an application form for additional supplies. The form Application for Additional Stoma Supples-Clinical is available from your STN, WAOA HQ, or the Human Services website: www.humanservices.gov.au/organisations/h

ealth-professionals/forms/pb050

Once completed the form is valid for up to six months.

Members must organise a review with an STN or GP before the form expires if additional products are still needed. We suggest you mark this date on your calendar as a reminder.

You must indicate the extra supply needed when you place your order.

Postage

Your Management Committee has had to increase the cost of postage to the flat rate of \$12 per parcel from October 2024. This is a break-even rate and will be reviewed again in June.

Express parcels will remain unchanged.

NB: To make the most of your postage, double orders are encouraged. However, there are a few exceptions:

- If you haven't had your stoma for 6 months yet and it is still changing size/shape
- you're still trying to find a product that works for you
- your next STN review may cause you to change products
- you're anticipating reversal of your stoma shortly

Holiday Supplies

- Members going on holidays can order a double supply in advance
- If you are travelling to other parts of Australia, you can order supplies from other Australian Associations using your member number if necessary. Ostomy Australia's national magazine has a Directory of Ostomy Associations
- For travel periods overseas longer than two months you must provide a copy of your itinerary with travel dates clearly identified with your supplies order. Up to six months of supplies can be ordered this way
- WAOA has a travel brochure transcribed into several languages describing what an Ostomy is which you may find helpful for security screening at overseas airports
- WAOA cannot send products overseas.

Reversals

If you have been given a date for your reversal:

- Arrange to see your STN before going to hospital for the procedure
- Consider if you need to order a full supply of products? Perhaps you need less stock?
- Make arrangements to notify WAOA after your procedure has been completed
- Return any unused products to WAOA
- Help can be given for your return to nostoma status
- An information pamphlet is available from WAOA on request

Postage

To help reduce our administrative time, please consider making payments for several orders at a time.

Your Ordering

"Order what you need to use – and use what you order" remains our request. We still need that 2 weeks' notice for your order because we live on this side of the continent!

Don't be anxiously awaiting your next delivery, but neither have more than a month's supply in reserve. Protection of the Stoma Appliance Scheme is everyone's business, so please check your storage area before ordering each time. Just because you have ordered something before, you don't have to re-order it if you no longer use that item.

NOTE: Recently we have had 4 members request that they return stock they are still using because, "I have too much on my shelf". This request was refused!!!!

If you have a cupboard full of something, just don't order that item until the level reaches a more appropriate one. Seems like common sense? You will not lose out!

Membership Fees





There were 7 members present, and we welcomed one new member, Ellen Hickman. Apologies were received from long time stalwarts Tom and Betty Reed, as well as our STN Rachael van den Hoek.

As per the usual, our new member was given the opportunity to introduce herself and elaborate on her journey into becoming an ostomate. It appears that she might not be staying an ostomate for very much longer as the procedure allows for a reversal sometime down the track, but she was assured that she would always be welcome if she wished to join in with our meetings in the future.

The other members posed a few questions and shared their experiences, and time flew in a pleasant fashion despite the low numbers present.

The meeting donated the sum of \$13.50 to the kitty, bringing this up to a current total of \$153. It was moved and passed that the sum of \$100 be donated to Albany Hospice and \$50 to the Free Reformed Church of Albany for the use of their facilities during this past year. Coffee and cake and socialising was enjoyed again by all afterwards for what had been another relaxing and enjoyable meeting.

Our next meeting is scheduled for the 7th of March 2025, same time same place, all things being equal.

PS: I almost didn't get around to writing this report, as there was really very little to report on, and I did feel a bit despondent at the low numbers we were experiencing recently. But then I reconsidered, and admonished myself as the members who did attend obviously did appreciate the opportunity to exchange experiences and catch up with each other, and then numbers are not crucially important to the purpose of the meetings.

However, the meetings do have a lot more value if there is a goodly number present and we have the valuable input of our STN and one or more stoma sales reps providing us with relevant information about their products to consider. As the old adage goes - a problem shared is a problem halved, whilst a joy shared is a joy doubled is still so very true!

So, to any stoma patient in the Albany area who is reading this: please don't be shy! Make the effort to come and attend our meetings and let us share the struggles and joys of living with a stoma with you. You'll be surprised at how encouraging and uplifting an experience this can be.

PPS: In the light of our previous meeting's discussion re the effectiveness of stoma bag adherence in hot weather, I had the privilege of holidaying in Cairns for a week at the beginning of February to celebrate our eldest son's 50th birthday, and experienced that my bags barely made it over my normal 2-day period due to the hot, sticky, tropical weather.

I was forced to change them a bit more frequently, but thankfully did not experience any leakages. We copped over 600 ml of rain over the 7-day period we were there; wish we could have diverted some of that to WA! But it did make for fantastic waterfalls!

And the security at the airports? Not a problem. They very discreetly took me aside and asked me to wipe my hands over my stoma bag and then they wiped a wand over my hand and tested it for whatever, and I was free to go!

WA Ostomy Bears Bring Joy in Vietnam

Dear Fellow Ostomates,

My name is Kelly and I'm the creator of "Ostomy Support Bears WA." I want to express my heartfelt appreciation for all of you. I create special ostomy bears - teddy bears with ostomy bags that children, adults, friends and family can remove to see the stoma and learn a little about this new way of going to the toilet. Some people may be contemplating or recently had this type of surgery or have had a stoma for a long time. Over the past six years, I've been honoured to have sent out more than 7,150 bears globally! putting smiles on people's faces, helping educate non-ostomates and reducing the stigma associated with having an ostomy.

I'd like to share a recent experience that touched my heart. In November, I travelled to Vietnam for my first holiday since COVID. I decided to donate ostomy bears to a children's hospital nearby in Ho Chi Minh City. Although it was a "poor people's hospital" (heartbreaking to see) I was eager to spread joy. My brother accompanied me on my holidays as my wheelchair chauffer, (I can't walk for any distance due to arthritis). I suggested we take 20 bears.

Despite language barriers, we used Google Translate to navigate to the hospital. The visit was profoundly moving. The wards were open, with patients resting in hammocks in open corridors due to the lack of space in the rooms of 12 infants to 1 adult. It was a mix of resilience and hope. The children's excitement at receiving the bears was priceless and their parents were equally thrilled.

An especially memorable moment was with a little girl in a purple nightgown where I'm sitting on her bed so her mum could take pictures. I handed her a bear and her mother's delight lit up the room. The mother revealed her daughter's own ostomy bag, creating a meaningful connection. When I showed her mine, she seemed somewhat confused but fascinated that I too had an ostomy.

This journey was enlightening for my brother - he turned to me and said, "I get it"! You can't buy that feeling of giving something as simple as a bear to people - it was a moment that resonated deeply for both of us.

For those new to our community, having an ostomy has transformed my life for the better. After nearly 27 years, I can say it has given me a second chance after battling Crohn's disease. I wish I had understood its liberating

potential sooner. The difference in my quality of life with the bag gave me a life I had forgotten existed - travelling the world, working in demanding jobs, going out with my friends, dating and finishing my social work degree. My ileostomy has not stopped me once from doing something I have wanted to do, and I say that whole heartedly.

So don't let it stop you from doing all the wonderful things life has to offer when you're not bound to a toilet. Don't be afraid to get out there doing all the things you want to do because you can.

The bears originated from a gift my brother gave me, highlighting the impact they can have. Then a comment made by Carmel Boylan, one of the wonderful STN's here at the Perth Children's Hospital about trying to get them made locally because they are very expensive for us to get from the UK.

With help of local strangers and friends, I began crafting these bears in Perth. I'm grateful for everyone supporting this cause, especially Lynn Fisher, who has been incredibly helpful. Annette Glanville has been making bears almost from the start, having made almost 700 handmade bears and clothes that are just adorable.

Unfortunately, Annette has recently had to stop as she had multiple issues which she has had since she came onboard, but the joy she got from doing them and her ability to be as amazing as she is showed in her everyday life and she couldn't let them stop her. I couldn't be more grateful for her contribution to *Ostomy Support Bears WA* and 700 of you are loving one of her bears.

CARING for Someone? Help & Support is Available!

Who Are Carers?

The Carers Australia website defines it the following way -

"Carers are people who provide unpaid care and support to family members and friends who have a disability, mental illness, chronic condition, terminal illness, an alcohol or other drug issue or who are frail aged. Carers are an integral part of Australia's health system and are the foundation of our aged, disability, palliative and community care systems."

Resources such as Carers Australia, Carers WA, the Carer Gateway and the Australian Carers Guide are just a handful that are available online and below are a few examples and facts on what they have to offer.

Carers Australia is the national peak body representing Australia's unpaid carers, advocating on their behalf to influence policies and services at a national level.

Their vision is an Australia that values and supports the contribution that carers make both to the people they care for and to the community as a whole.

Carers WA (a member organisation of Carers Australia) is the peak body that represents the needs and interests of carers in Western Australia. They work to achieve an improved quality of life for family carers in our state. Carers WA is a non-profit, community-based organisation and registered charity dedicated to improving the lives of the estimated 230,000 family carers living in Western Australia.

They can provide information for the **Carer Gateway** and other providers, carer wellness at home, carer retreats, social support and even support for young carers. If you want to start a conversation about being a carer and what your rights are this is a great place to start!

Some statistics from Carers Australia and all their contact details and website addresses are listed below.

Carer Statistics...

- There are over 3 million carers across Australia *
- Carers make up nearly 12% of Australia's population *
- ➤ 4.6% of all Australians (1.2 million people) are primary carers, those who provide the most informal support to a family member or friend *
 - Two-thirds of primary carers are female *
 - The average age of a primary carer is 54 *
- ➤ 11% of carers are under the age of 25 an increase of 60% since 2018 *
- 30% of primary carers cared for 40 hours per week or more *
- 43.8% of primary carers have a disability themselves *
 - > 58.3% of carers have low wellbeing compared to 30.4% of all Australians ^

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Stomal Therapy Nurse News...

It's a little late to wish you a Happy New Year as by the time you read this, we are already a quarter of the way through the year, but regardless, I hope it has been a good beginning.

STN Advice - Extra supply certificates

January saw us renew and complete over 25 extra supply certificates. A certificate enables you to receive above and beyond the allowance allocated by the Stoma Appliance Scheme (SAS) for your bags and accessories. Whilst its generally thought that the allowances are adequate for most people, there are occasions where you may need extra and this can be arranged with your STN. The STN will discuss your situation and possibly ask you if the reason for additional supplies is due to frequent leakages - this is normally something that we can rectify.

If the certificate is authorised, you must order the extra amount when placing your order as it isn't automatically added for you: conversely if you don't need the additional amount each month, **please don't stockpile**. The certificate is valid for up to 6 months: you may not be notified that the certificate is about to expire so please put a note in your diary to contact your STN a month before the end date if you still require those extras.

STN Activities

In addition to running the STN clinic and organising the annual rural visits to the 12 regional areas as Bowel and Stoma Health WA, there has been opportunity to work on other projects.

Peer Support Program

As you are probably aware we are setting up a peer support program so that every potential ostomate has the opportunity to speak to an existing ostomate who would understand some of the anxiety and fears they may have around becoming an ostomate.

To establish our Peer Support Program, it is a requirement that our organisation has the correct processes in place to be able to support those offering their help. At the beginning of February, we have 28 members who have expressed an interest in helping others. We aim to match people of like ages and types of stomas, so identified gaps are for males aged 30 - 60 with an ileostomy, our younger colostomates 18 - 30, both male and female and males aged 30 - 60 with a colostomy.

In our urostomy category we do not have males or females from 18 – 60. We are also looking for dual ostomates ileostomy/urostomy and colostomy/urostomy of both genders. If you feel you would be able to support others facing the same surgery you have had, please either email info@waostomy.org.au or telephone 92721833 during office hours.

Window Display

We are still working behind the scenes on our window display at WAOA headquarters to increase awareness of what an ostomy/stoma is for the general public and are currently in the process of editing photos for use.

Hernia Forum

Unfortunately, the development of hernias around stomas is a common occurrence and we often have questions from ostomates in relation to either their prevention, management and/or treatment. In response to the number of enquiries regarding hernias we organised a hernia forum where we invited a Researcher, Exercise Physiologist and Surgeon to present. The response from ostomates wishing to attend has been overwhelming. We are hoping to record the event for those members that couldn't attend to view on our website.

Airport Follow Up

We were very saddened to hear of the recurrence of poor treatment of ostomates by security staff at Perth Airport again over the December holiday period which included one of our staff members. This setback at Airport security is very disappointing given the improvements we had seen previously however, rest assured we are onto it and by the time you read this Emily (who is on Perth Airport's Access and Inclusion Advisory Panel) would have attended a security staff education session and hopefully we can again expect consistent, positive treatment of our members. Please do let us know if you encounter any difficulties, in addition to complaining directly to Perth Airport as soon after the event as possible – good experiences are also welcome!

DISABILITY TOILET ACCESS CARDS

Did you know that when you become an ostomate you are given a disability toilet access pass card? The card identifies you as someone who requires urgent access to a toilet due to a medical condition.

These cards authorise Members to use Disabled Toilets in public places and can be shown if your use of these toilets is questioned. Ostomates sometimes report being challenged as they enter or leave a disabled toilet because they don't look like the wheelchair logo displayed on disabled toilet doors.

Bowel & Stoma Health WA News

Early February I travelled to Albany and Esperance where I worked alongside Rachael Van Den Hoek - resident STN at Albany Hospital. We travelled to 3 residential care homes (RCH) reviewing the ostomates there and providing education sessions to the staff at each facility. Rachael is unable to visit RCHs as part of her role so was pleased to be able to review them. I also ran a clinic for ostomates not on Rachael's list and was able to refer to her for ongoing support.

In Esperance I was able to attend the monthly support group in addition to running a clinic where over 13 ostomates were booked. Home visits were also conducted and further education provided to RCH, hospital and community staff.

At the end of February, I will fly to Melbourne to provide an education session on peristomal skin complications to other STNs sponsored by Coloplast - the last in the series which took me across the country last year.

In March I will attend the first support group meeting of the year in Narrogin and offer a STN clinic along with education to hospital and RCH staff and hopefully catch up with Emma - the newly qualified STN for the region. It is envisaged that Emma will take over the clinic and support group once sorted in her new position.

Hopefully in March I will have time to travel to Kalgoorlie. I will also be looking at the need for a STN clinic in Northam now that we don't have a regular clinic since Sharon has changed positions.

Support Groups

In January I attended the support group for those in the Dunsborough/Busselton region which was held in the Cape Naturalist Community Centre: thank you to Deb for her yummy cake - the group will continue to run with Jim, Deb and Audrey at the helm.

Lorrie and Estelle attended the first support group in York in February which saw 7 members attend, this now takes the number of support groups to 13 which is fabulous.



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



DID YOU KNOW?

An Ostomate's Guide to Food

(Source: A New Beginning, an ACSA publication)

Here are some general guidelines about what some foods and beverages can do to a stoma output – different foods and beverages will affect output, though this may vary depending on the type of stoma.

Everyone's metabolism is different. It is essential to introduce new foods gradually, chew all food well and have adequate fluid intake. Ask your STN if you have any questions, or whether you should follow a special diet.

Food that can obstruct

These need to be chewed thoroughly: apple skins, raw cabbage, celery, citrus fruits, coconut, coleslaw, corn kernels, dried fruit, frankfurters, grape skins, mushrooms, nuts, peas, pineapple, popcorn, potato skins, sausage skins, seeds, tomato skins.

Food and drink that can increase output

Alcohol, beef, bran cereals, broccoli, cooked cabbage, fresh fruit (but not bananas), grape juice, leafy greens, licorice, milk, prunes and juice, raisins, spicy foods, raw vegetables.

Food and drink that can thicken output

Apple sauce, stewed apples, bananas, cheese, buttermilk, marshmallows, boiled milk, noodles, pasta, creamy peanut butter, pretzels, white rice, tapioca, toast, yoghurt, white bread.

Food and drink that can produce wind

Alcohol, beans, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, carbonated drink, corn, cucumber, dairy products, meringues, mushrooms, nuts, onions, peas, radishes, soy, spinach, cauliflower.

Food and drink that can cause odour

Asparagus, baked beans, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, strong cheese, eggs, fish, garlic, mustard, onions, peanut butter, spices.

Food and drink that can help to control odour

Buttermilk, cranberry juice, orange juice, parsley, tomato juice, voghurt.

Food and drink that can help with constipation

Warm/hot beverages, cooked fruits, cooked vegetables, fresh fruits, fruit juices, water.

'Diet' Pills to Blame?

USA: A woman from Pennsylvania is suing the manufacturer of prescription drugs Ozempic and Wegovy, claiming the drugs were responsible for leaving her with an ileostomy.

Juanita Gantt said her doctor prescribed the trendy weight-loss drugs, produced by pharmaceutical giant Novo Nordis, because she had a higher risk for diabetes and wanted to shed 10 kilos. Gantt said she was initially feeling fine for the first few months of her treatment until her husband found her unconscious on the floor in October, 2023.

Doctors discovered that sections of her large intestine died and needed to be removed – her colon was removed as a result and she now has a permanent ileostomy. Gantt claims the labels don't properly warn users and doctors about serious side effects like gastroparesis, stomach paralysis, or even bowel obstruction.

Novo Nordis said the allegations in the lawsuits were without merit and it will "vigorously defend against these claims." The drugs are prescribed for treating diabetes but have become popular as an aid in weight loss.

Semaglutide and liraglutide – the key ingredients in Ozempic, Wegovy and similar drugs –are GLP-1 receptor agonists, which can delay food digestion if taken for extended periods of time. – Source: nypost.com

Ostomy on the Street

UK: Long-running soap opera Coronation Street has aired a storyline based on a significant health issue that experts are urging viewers to see as a warning – as well as raising more awareness about ostomies.

Character Bethany Platt, portrayed by Lucy Fallon, faces life-altering consequences following her decision to have cosmetic surgery overseas which goes wrong — Bethany ends up with an ileostomy.

Following the botched operation, she develops sepsis and is informed she'll have to live with a permanent stoma. Data from a 2023 study published by The British Association of Aesthetic Plastic Surgeons indicates the number of people requiring hospital treatment in Britain after having surgery abroad had risen by 94 per cent over three years.

In the UK, about 200,000 people (one in 335) live with a stoma. Coronation Street collaborated with Colostomy UK to portray its stoma storyline with both precision and care.

Giovanni Cinque, the marketing and campaigns manager for Colostomy UK, said even though public awareness had grown considerably over the past few > thanks to a number of celebrities revealing they have had stoma surgery, the challenges that people faced living with a stoma were less known.

"This means that we as a society and as individuals are not as aware as we should be of the choices that we can make to positively improve ostomates' quality of life," he said.

"We really hope that Bethany's journey will go a long way in helping to educate the audience and thus help to create a more Stoma Aware UK. It's also been a pleasure for us to work with the behind-the-scenes teams at Coronation Street on this story."

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WCET* CONFERENCE & IOG MEETING - GLASGOW, SCOTLAND 2024

My name is Julie, and I was able to attend the IOG (International Ostomy Guidelines) meeting and the WCET (World Council of Enterostomal Therapists) conference in Glasgow, Scotland in September / October 2024.

Just a quick introduction as to where this journey began:

I became an ostomate in February 2023 when I had surgery due to a recurrence of my cervical cancer and having a pelvic exenteration was my only option of surviving my cancer. I had my surgery at King Edward Memorial Hospital (KEMH) with Emma Allanson and her amazing team and another corrective surgery at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital (SCGH) in September 2023. I was a patient in KEMH for 3 months and then had around 2 more months of recovery due to complications. I was then a patient in SCGH for around 3 weeks with more recovery at home due to some complications again.

I was diagnosed with cervical cancer in June 2021 and then again with a recurrence in October 2022.

I was lucky enough to have Dr. Jenny Prentice join the same company that I work for in 2018 and have been lucky enough to now work in the same aged care home with Jenny for the last few years.

Jenny approached me when I was back at work after my surgery and asked if I would like to be part of a group that contributed to the re-working of the IOG guidelines.

Last year, Jenny advised me that there was going to be a meeting held in Glasgow, Scotland to start discussions on the guidelines.

Jenny approached the Australian and West Australian Ostomy associations as well as the CEO of the company that we work for and was able to secure some funding to assist me to attend the meeting in Glasgow alongside her.

We left Perth for Glasgow on Monday 23rd September 2024 and arrived on Tuesday 24th September 2024.

We met on Friday 27th September with the other members of the IOG steering committee as well as another consumer advocate and started discussions about the guidelines.

In attendance at the meeting was myself, Dr. Jenny Prentice, Laurent Chabel (WCET President), Dr Elizabeth Ayello (Past President), Denise Hibbert (President Elect), Professor Emily Haesler (Methodologist) and Richard McNair (Consumer Advocate). It was such an honor being in the presence of such amazing people and being able to listen to their information and ideas and being able to have their attention in a room where I could contribute my thoughts.

The meeting was very beneficial to myself as I was able to learn a lot about what information is put into the guidelines and what information is considered by medical professionals. The guidelines are a document that provides health professionals with recommendations about how best to manage ostomies and the important considerations in partnering with consumers in their care at all stages. There is a strong focus on getting input into the guidelines from consumers and nurses and doctors from all around the world. The team will take about a year to develop the documents and then work on some resources specifically for consumers as well.

I believe that it was important for me to be there too so that I could be a voice of a consumer to the medical professionals to be able to capture information from a patient's perspective that they might not have known.

On Saturday 28th September 2024, the WCET conference began with a welcoming ceremony of the different countries' representatives displaying their countries flags / attire. The ceremony was amazing and such a once in a lifetime event to witness. It was so spectacular to see so many medical professionals from so many different countries in attendance and coming to the realization of how many people work in this field. It was a great feeling knowing myself and other patients in the world are so greatly supported.

WCET* CONFERENCE & IOG MEETING - GLASGOW, SCOTLAND 2024

The WCET conference continued from Sunday 29th September 2024 and into the following week. During my attendance on Sunday 29th, I was able to sit in on so many fascinating presentations and view so many great product / company stalls in the main room.

My favorite presentation was from Gill Castle who was the first woman with a stoma to swim solo across the English Channel. She was so amazing and inspiring and brought tears to my eyes. When she finished her presentation, the whole auditorium erupted with applause and cheers and gave me goosebumps!

I left Glasgow the following day on Monday 30th September 2024 to return to Perth.

After the trip to Glasgow, I felt great about the information that I was able to contribute and the information that I received. It was very eye-opening to hear about some conditions / access to supplies in some countries and made me feel very fortunate for the support and medical attention that I can receive living in Australia.

I feel that my attendance was also important to other patients in my same position. I can be a voice for many people and a carrier of information back to them. I am a member of a couple of online support groups and happy to help others that are coming up to their surgeries by offering my support and information that I have gained.

I am looking forward to attending the next IOG meeting later this year to keep on being able to contribute and to be

updated on changes since our meeting in Glasgow.

I also wanted to mention the support of the WA Ostomy Association. Not only the monetary support that they have been able to arrange from the Australian Council of Stoma Associations, but the support of the staff there. The staff are always more than happy to answer any questions and they are so fast to get in touch.

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
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
